**Greetings from Revd Sue Keegan von Allmen
Minister, United Free Church**

Dear friends,
It seems strange to me - and no doubt to you too - that I should be writing as a minister of one of the churches in Radlett from Knebworth! My first visit to Radlett was as a member of the Hertfordshire Ecumenical Committee. As I heard more about the ecumenical relationships established between the churches, I found myself being both confused and inspired. The idea of a united congregation of two or more denominations isn't confusing. I am also the minister of a united Methodist and United Reformed church in Knebworth and I enjoy working in a church with different traditions - especially as we try to use the best of each at the same time as remaining open to the new ways God's spirit is leading us. However, I hadn't heard of several churches covenanting together whilst remaining separate worshipping congregations, and, if that sounds confusing to an



outsider, it may do to some insiders too!
The more I learnt, though, the more convinced I became about the value of covenanted partnerships, and we are also exploring one in Knebworth. My experience is that relationships between the churches - even when they are part of Churches Together groups - is often undermined by a subtle sense of competition. This limits cooperation and affects our united witness. It isn't usually spoken about, but it's akin to the relationships that exist between clubs in competition with each other: friendly but ever so slightly wary. I have no doubt that our responsibility for witnessing to God's love for all people is of far greater importance than the particular ways our particular traditions have chosen to express this. So I'm delighted to be a minister in a group of churches that has taken the risk of working together more seriously than many - albeit at a distance!

COMFORTING THE DISTURBED AND DISTURBING THE COMFORTABLE

John Elliott was born almost 62 years ago in the West Country city of Bath. Baptised and brought up as an Anglican, by the time he left Oxford, where he read Philosophy, Politics and Economics, he had become a convinced atheist - not a doubting agnostic, but one who believed that there is definitively no God. It was to be fourteen years before, screaming and kicking every inch of the way, he was dragged back to faith by God. When he returned to faith, it was to become a Catholic.



developing the theory. By the time he left to go to seminary for priestly training, he was in charge of management audit for all the ITT companies in Europe, Africa and the Middle East; he and his staff were riding herd on more than 500 companies, employing 100,000 people and with a combined turnover in excess of \$11 bn - which was a lot of money in those days. When asked about leaving that kind of life for the priesthood, he tends to shrug and talk of "changing one multi-national for another".

In the meantime, he had been working in business. Apart from three years as Chief of the Finance Division of the Commonwealth Telecommunications Organization, he worked entirely for multi-national companies. He came to specialise in management audit, which uses the investigative techniques initially developed to detect fraud and applies them to analysing how companies are being managed. These were the early days of the discipline, which gave the opportunity to be involved in

After four years, training at the Collegio Beda in Rome, he was ordained in 1988 and sent as assistant priest to St John Fisher, North Harrow, where his parish priest was Fr Keith Barltrop (now in charge of the Catholic Agency to Support Evangelisation).

Rather less than two years later he volunteered to go as assistant to Fr Michael Hollings at St Mary of the Angels, Bayswater. Fr Michael had pioneered the concept of

'The Open House'. Arguing that priests, whilst they have little money, are not in any real sense poor (they never have to worry about having food to eat or a place to live or keeping warm), he determined to give up his privacy. All the spare rooms in the house were filled with people in need of somewhere to live and the front door of the building stood wide open from morning to night. In Central London that inevitably attracted large numbers of addicts. With that came violence and during Fr John's time there they were averaging one attempted murder actually in the presbytery each year.

After five years at St Mary's, the Bishops appointed Fr John as parish priest of St John Fisher, Shepperton, commenting "We thought you deserved a bit of a rest - don't count on it lasting too long." It didn't! Within a matter of weeks he was appointed Diocesan Director of Pontifical Missions and subsequently Dean of the Upper Thames. He was also asked to become pastoral assistant to Bishop Patrick O'Donoghue, at that time Bishop in West London, retaining that role for some six years both during his time at Shepperton, and during his subsequent time as parish priest at Perivale, until Bishop Pat was appointed to the Diocese of Lancaster in 2001.

Just before Holy Week in 2004 - in a

seriously inconvenient piece of timing - Fr John was whipped into coronary care at Ealing Hospital, and this was the prelude to three pieces of keyhole surgery over the next couple of years. With major changes forecast at Perivale, it was decided that it was time for a new parish priest to be appointed and Fr John spent 2006 in a mixture of sabbatical and sick leave, before being appointed as parish priest of St Anthony's in Radlett with pastoral care of the Good Shepherd parish at Shenley. He says he looks forward to spending the rest of his ministry here.

As a minister he has a passion for growing lay participation, but participation of the right kind - the kind that enables people to develop for themselves the ways in which they serve God and each other, not the kind in which some parishioners take it upon themselves to lay burdens on others; lay participation that is rooted in service and love, not in power and getting one's own way.

His other passion is for helping adults to engage with their faith and to discover the sheer exhilaration of being drawn ever closer to their God. Since that can only happen when people accept that what they know is always far less than what they don't know, he is a firm adherent to the maxim that Christ came to comfort the disturbed - and to disturb the comfortable.

The Future of Unison

After many years of sterling service, the Unison editors, Wendy, Dorothy and Christine decided last year that the time had come for them to retire. Very helpfully they gave a years' notice to allow time for a new team to be found. The Radlett Ecumenical Christian Council (RECC), as the managing body for Unison, expressed their gratitude to the editorial team and decided to use a questionnaire, both to advertise the need for new editors and contributors, and to gain feedback on the future direction of Unison. The outcome is a new editorial team in place for the next edition of Unison, May/June.

Eleni Patel has been working with the current editorial team to provide continuity; she will be joined by Kay Sanchez, Alan Callow and Cynthia Hunt in the new team.

YOUR PRAYER PAGE

'WHAT SHALL WE PRAY, THIS LENT, HOLY WEEK AND EASTER?'

I have just read a book* which Alan Bennett (actor, author, playwright and T.V. personality) describes as 'heroic, humbling and inspiring.' It is the story of how Michael Mayne, a former Dean of Westminster Abbey, was asked by his publishers to write about the fundamentals of his own Christian discipleship. Not long after he had started writing he was told he had cancer of the jaw. He was then prepared for and underwent a twelve hour operation, enduring months of painful convalescence, only to be told the cancer had spread and no further surgery was possible.



The heart of the book is a diary which shows how his trust in the Christ-like God was refined and strengthened by his sufferings. As he wrote, barely a month after the operation, 'Yes, I find God in the evil of my cancer. Not that he sent it, but that he is to be found in it and through it.'

Here are four short passages from the book which I intend to use this Lent and Holy Week and Easter-tide, as springs and inspiration for my prayers; and you may wish to do the same? Here and there I have added words in brackets which clarify the meaning without - I hope - distorting it.

1. '(We are) people who have been called, in Paul's potent phrase, 'to put on the Lord Jesus Christ, we in him and he in us.'
2. '...it is in the (crucified and) risen Christ that we catch a scent of what God is and what we are created to be.'
3. 'To be a Christian is to learn to see everything through the prism of Christ; to see yourself, and everyone else; to see the purpose and meaning of your life, newly defined in him.'
4. 'Christianity is to be understood simply and solely in terms of a **relationship of love** (with Christ) which, once entered into, changes you - and has the power to go on changing you, however frustratingly slowly...'

Bearing in mind the acute suffering and shattered hopes and, towards the end, the fact of his approaching death, I was deeply moved by these quotations, and they set me thinking. What could be more appropriate for Lent and Holy Week and Easter than 'to put on the Lord Jesus Christ'; to contemplate the (crucified and) risen Christ and to catch afresh the 'scent' of His presence; to learn to see everything and everyone through the prism of Christ; and to understand our Christian faith in terms of a relationship of love (with Christ Himself)?

Surely these are challenging yet practical goals for our prayers this Lent and Easter. May it be for each of us a time of spiritual growth and deepening gratitude to Christ, our risen Saviour, Master, Brother, Friend.

used for storage and partitioned off for a couple of consulting rooms and an over-spill recreation area. This has now been refurbished to provide a large well-equipped hall, new kitchen store room, toilets and store rooms. On the first floor it also provides a new well-equipped exercise room (which we would call a gym), recreation rooms, a library area (as yet without shelves but with many books from Radlett), a reading room and a lounge area in a gallery overlooking the main hall.

We then inspected the, as yet, unoccupied bedrooms now nearly all en suite, carpeted and with curtains and basic furniture. These will be occupied early this year when sufficient are completed, which will mean all the existing residents will occupy new accommodation at the same time. The presently occupied rooms on the second and third floors will then be up-graded to allow for a further fourteen residents. What has been achieved in a relatively short time is amazing and a credit to the staff and clients working with the contractors, who will be completing the contract of three planned phases eight weeks ahead of schedule.

Before making our farewells, Sr. Elizabeth informed us that they anticipated catering for at least forty for Christmas. Fr. John would be in attendance as he frequently does a stint of night duty in any one of the many houses. Also, when the current project is complete, the new hall complex will be named the John Kitchen Hall, a truly lasting tribute to such a great man of vision and faith in achieving what to most of us mere mortals would be an unobtainable dream.

The Kairos Community Trust

Our editors reminded me that it is a long time since there was an update on the activities of Kairos. In fact it was in July 2005 when I reported on the farewell events and tributes to Fr. John Kitchen.

Much has happened since the great celebrations in June 2005. There have been changes in personnel, clients, new move on houses and property alterations and improvements. Some things have not changed; the prevailing attitude of commitment, hope and the sense of worthwhile achievement are evident when visiting Linden Grove in Peckham. My main contacts have always been with Linden Grove as that was the first property occupied when Kairos vacated their headquarters near Clapham Common.

I am certain that the same atmosphere must prevail in their other houses as the programme of rehabilitation progresses via the various Centres to move on houses prior to returning hopefully to a full independent life in the community. The policy which is adopted allows for clients to return at any time if they feel the need. Doors are always open and all are made welcome.

Over the years that we, at St. Anthony's, have been supporting Kairos, it is noticeable that a number of the helpers are ex-clients who give freely of their time and energy to assist in what they realise is a marvellous opportunity to help those in need.

Just before Christmas, Chris Parkin and I made a trip to Peckham with a car well-laden with all manner of goods from clothing, bedding, books, shoes and a very varied assortment of tinned and packet food, cakes and jams, cereals, beverages (non-alcoholic) and monetary donations from our congregation.

As the car was unloaded Sr. Elizabeth, who is almost a fixture, immediately sorted the food items out and informed us that the shopping list which she had just completed would be significantly reduced, thus giving her the opportunity to spend some of her budget on a few more festive goodies for Christmas.

After a lengthy chat with Sr. Elizabeth and other members of staff, we were given a conducted tour of the old church hall, which had been previously

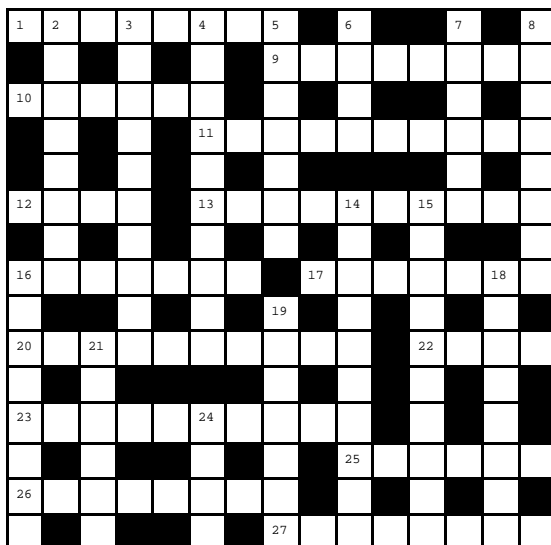

Off to Malawi !

On March 31st I leave to spend four months in Malawi as part of a Tearfund Transform team. There are eight others on my team between the ages of 18-61. We will be based mainly in the capital, Lilongwe, where we will be assisting on a number of projects in the community.



Life expectancy in Malawi is now as low as 36 years and there are more than a million orphans, 700,000 of whom became orphans when their parents died of AIDS. Furthermore, over 55% of the population earn less than \$1 a day. It is statistics like this that we are hoping to be a part of changing through the work that we do.

One of the areas we will be working in is assisting in the already existing "Christian & Moral Lifeskills" project for AIDS prevention, which aims to equip young people in schools and churches in Malawi with knowledge and information that will help prevent the spread of AIDS, which is currently crippling their country. We will also be involved in schools and youth camps as well as immersing ourselves in the life of the Malawian church and helping out wherever possible. We will have the opportunity to be involved in feeding programmes in orphanages as well as many other areas which are still unknown to us. Nearly as important as all of the projects we'll be working on is the fact that we have the opportunity to live beside people and care for a community for whom the above statistics are not merely statistics, but problems that they face day after day.
